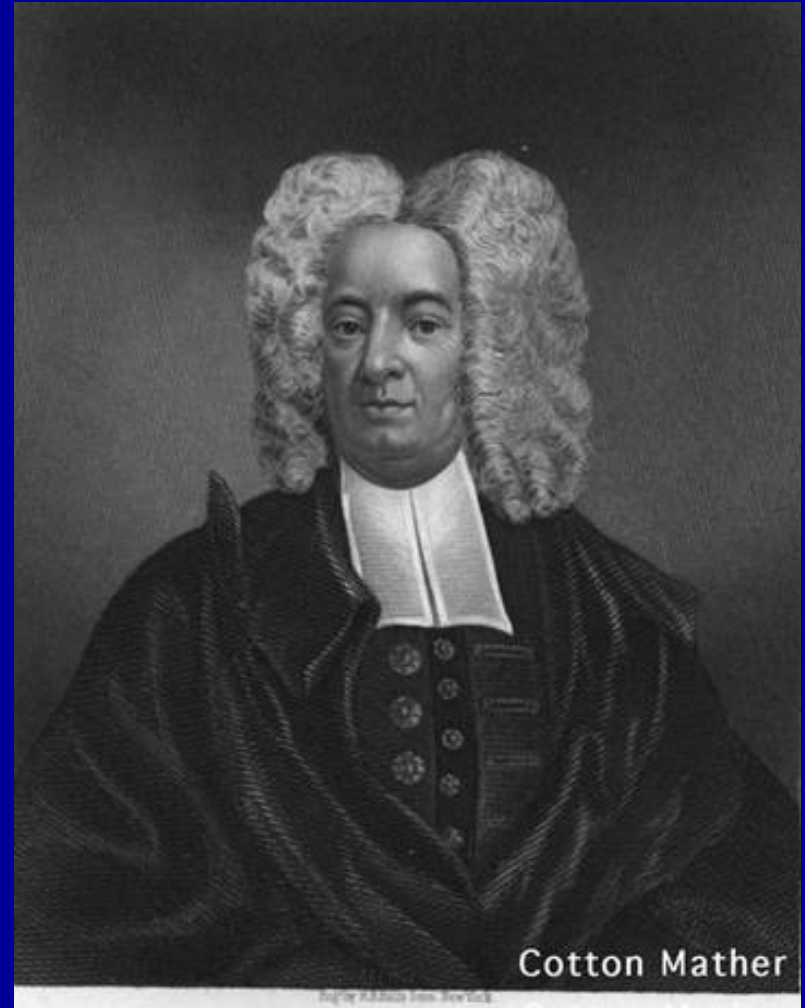
The Great Awakening began under the preaching of Jonathan Edwards, the pastor of a Congregational Church in Northampton, Massachusetts in 1734.
